

ARTHUR MILNES Canada Always: The Definind Speeches of Sir Wilfred Laurier






BEN MACINTYRE Rogue Heroes



Stirling sought to assemble a crack team of highly trained men who would parachute in behind enemy lines to throw monkey wrenches into the German war machine. Though he faced stiff resistance from those who believed such activities violated the classic rules of war, Stirling persevered and in the process created a legacy. Written with complete access to the never-before-seen SAS archives, Rogue Heroes offers a powerfully intimate look at life on the battlefield.

The Necessary War: Canadians Fighting the Second World War, 1939-1943

Tim Cook, Canada's leading war historian, ventures deep into the Second World War in this epic two-volume story. Written in Cook's compelling narrative style, this book shows in impressive detail how soldiers, airmen, and sailors fought. Cook also examines the war as an engine of transformation for Canada. With a population of fewer than twelve million, Canada embraced its role as an arsenal of democracy, raising a million-strong armed forces. The six-year-long exertion provoked nationwide industrialization, ushered in changes to gender roles, and forged a new sense of Canadian identity.

Historian Tim Cook displays his trademark storytelling ability in the second volume of his masterful account of Canadians in World War II. Cook combines an extraordinary grasp of military strategy with a deep empathy for the soldiers on the ground, at sea and in the air. Featuring dozens of black-and-white photographs and moving excerpts from letters and diaries of servicemen, Fight to the Finish, along with its companion volume, The Necessary War, broadens our understanding of the Second World War with a gripping account of Canadians who fought abroad, and the home front that was changed forever.

TIM COOK At the Sharp End: Canadians Fighting the Great War, 1914-1918

The first comprehensive history of Canadians in WWI in forty years, and already hailed as the definitive work on Canadians in the Great War, At the Sharp End covers the harrowing early battles of 1914-16. Hundreds of thousands died before the generals and soldiers found a way to break the terrible stalemate of the front. Based on eyewitness accounts detailed in the letters of ordinary soldiers, Cook describes the horrible struggle, first to survive in battle, and then to drive the Germans back. At the Sharp End provides both an intimate look at the Canadian men in the trenches and an authoritative account of the slow evolution in tactics, weapons, and advancement.

Shock Troops follows the Canadian fighting forces during the titanic battles of Vimy Ridge, Hill 70, Passchendaele, and the Hundred Days campaign. Through the eyes of the soldiers who fought and died in the trenches on the Western Front, and based on newly uncovered Canadian, British, and German archival sources, Cook builds on Volume I, At the Sharp End. The Canadian fighting forces never lost a battle during the final two years of the war, and although they paid a terrible price in the killing fields of the Great War, they were indeed, as British Prime Minister David Lloyd George exclaimed, the shock troops of the Empire.




DAVID JOHNSTON The Idea of Canada: Letters to a Nation

Dispatches from the Front

"This is Matthew Halton of the CBC." So began Matthew Halton's war broadcasts. Originally a reporter for the Toronto Star, Matt Halton, as Senior War Correspondent for the CBC during the Second World War, reported from the front lines in Italy and Northwest Europe, and became "the voice of Canada at war." His reports were at times tender and sad and other times shocking and explosive. For a decade he chronicled Europe's drift to disaster, covering the breakdown of the League of Nations, the Spanish Civil War, and the Nazi takeover of Austria and Czechoslovakia. Drawing on extensive interviews and archival research, this definitive biography, written by Matthew's son, acclaimed former CBC correspondent David Halton, is a fascinating look at the career of one of the most accomplished journalists Canada has ever known.




CONRAD BLACK Rise to Greatness:The History of Canada




MICHAEL WINTER Into the Blizzard:Walking the Fields of the Newfoundland Dead

DAVID O'KEEFE One Day in August

The Dieppe Raid has been one of the most perplexing mysteries of WWII, when almost 4,000 Canadian troops stormed the French port town, only to be ambushed by Germans. This catastrophe, coupled with the mystery surrounding the reason for the operation, left a legacy of controversial charges ranging from incompetence to conspiracy. O'Keefe's 15 years of research in the Intelligence archives of 5 countries now reveals that it was a vitally secret "pinch raid," organized by British Naval Intelligence and the Joint Intelligence Committee. The mission: under cover of a raid to secretly steal the German code books that would unlock the Enigma cipher machine that might have saved countless lives and shortened the war by some years. **Vintage Canada, TR, 512 PP, 9780345807700, \$22.00**

JOHN NADLER Valour Road

The First World War lasted for four years and three months. And when it ended on November 11, 1918, the people of Pine Street, a sleepy avenue on the outskirts of Winnipeg, came to a startling realization. During the course of the conflict, young Leo Clarke, Robert Shankland, and Fred Hall, all from their street, had each received the Victoria Cross, the highest award for bravery at that time. Such a phenomenon has never been repeated anywhere in the former British empire. Accessing original documents in his research, John Nadler constructs a story of the three heroic soldiers, their families, and the enormous impact of WWI on a young Canada.
